I've had the luxury of being associated with the club while it has been on solid footing. Although a few things have changed over the years, and we've had a few challenges, we have had a solid foundation to build on with our semiannual festival, monthly jam sessions, and community outreach initiatives.

Sincere, heartfelt thanks are in order for Jim Winger and Barb Collins, who were around during those formative years and were instrumental in bringing the club to where it is today. Please join us at the Memorial Day festival to celebrate their decades of work for our club.

I'd also like to welcome Stephanie Dray, who will be taking over for Barb as Secretary, and our new Vice President, Jim Winger (hey, I know that name from somewhere).

NIBGA was founded, and still exists today, as a service organization. That's why none of the board members or captains receive salaries or compensation for the work they do. We all do this for the love of the music, and helping the music thrive and grow while expanding its audience is all the reward we need. I hear often from bands performing at our festi-

val that they feel "at home" here, and they want to come back because the people are so good to them.

For a lot of folks, driving through the festival gate on Memorial Day and Labor Day weekends each year just "seems right". To a lot of us, the event is as much a reunion as a bluegrass festival. That's something I don't want to lose.

As we look forward to the future, we have a lot of reasons to be optimistic. But we also have some work to do. If we are going to continue our family atmosphere, and be a great place for fellow musicians to come for parking lot picking, we need to be welcoming to new attendees. To me, this begs a couple questions:

- How do we get the word out to people who aren't yet familiar with us? NIBGA currently advertises on Facebook, and through flyers at other bluegrass events. But, the world is changing, and bluegrass music along with it. Can we do more, or take a different approach, to reach the many young folks who are discovering the appeal of, and developing an interest in, roots music?
- Can we change or add events at the festival to make new attendees feel welcome, like they are "part of the family"? We currently have the Thursday night community dinner (hosted by, and proceeds to, the fairgrounds), and we all like to feel we are open to visitors at our camp site and fellow jammers. But, is it time to consider some type of welcoming event. Maybe an open potluck dur-

ing the early part of festival week? I would love to hear your thoughts.

I'd like to close this month by adding that it is important for NIBGA to develop our expertise in finding and securing grants and sponsorships. Now that NIBGA is a 501c3 organization, we can receive tax deductible donations. Although we pursued these in the past, with some success, we have a responsibility to get better, out of respect for NIBGA's past and so as to ensure her future for upcoming generations of bluegrass musicians.

The NIBGA board will be discussing these things over the next few months – please feel free to let me or one of the other board members or captains know if you have any thoughts you'd like to be considered. Remember, too, that you are always welcome to attend the board meetings on the third Sunday of the month. If you would like to address a particular topic, please let me know in advance so it can be put on the agenda.

Road until they contacted us through the NIBGA Facebook page last year. I was really impressed upon hearing them -- I can understand why they garnered an IBMA Momentum Band of the Year award in 2019, and why they have been nominated five times for an IBMA Momentum award.

They hail from Deep Gap, North Carolina, not far from the home of Doc Watson. No doubt drawing inspiration from Doc's old timey roots music, their brand of bluegrass is not anchored in the classic Stanley/Monroe/Flatt & Scruggs sounds of 1940's and 50's. Rather, their brand of bluegrass

has moved on down the road from those stalwart beginnings.

They pay homage to the older styles not as much from direct imitation as through furthering it with their own creative prowess. This is evident in the instrumental stylings of all members, leader Liam Purcell's mandolin and fiddle stylings, banjo player Tray Wellington's innovative approach, Casey Lewis's blues-laden guitar work, and bassist Elliot Smith's jazz-influenced playing. Vocally, they build some nice harmonies around either Casey's or Liam's lead.

They do some of the standard bluegrass repertoire, although they tend to rock them out a bit as one might expect from a band whose members are in their upper teens and early twenties. But they focus on original tunes and, to quote their web site, "Cool bluegrass covers of Dylan, The Beatles, The Rolling Stones, Tom Petty, Gordon Lightfoot." If you want to see the future of bluegrass, you'll definitely want to check out Cane Mill Road. Toe Steiner
