President's Corner - Joe Steiner



By the time you read this, the NIBGA board will be planning their arrival at the Noble County Fairgrounds, and it won't be long before things will start buzzing as folks begin arriving for the fall Tri-State Bluegrass festival.

As I reflect upon this festival and our 49th season, I'm reminded of the time, in 1998 or 1999, that Jim and Linda Winger made a visit to

the studio at WLFC (University of Findlay, Findlay, Ohio) where I was broadcasting my weekly radio show. We discussed Tri-State, then "only" 32 or 33 years old. When we discussed the lineup, program, and workshops, I was impressed enough to ask, "You're going to tell me now that this event must surely cost an arm and a leg."

Of course, they said that, on the contrary, Tri-State is an affordable, family-friendly event. The same is true today. And, although the WLFC studio has moved three times since then, Tri-State is still in the same location at the Noble County Fairgrounds. Much has changed over almost thirty years since that day, which roughly coincides with the beginning of my involvement with NIBGA.

But, the homegrown spirit of bluegrass music has stayed the same. As I reflect on the longevity of bluegrass music, I realize that any form of artistic expression must have room to change and grow - bluegrass music included. The attendees at the Debutants' Hoot Camp a couple weeks ago weren't even alive when Jim and Linda visited WLFC, but today they are helping to grow the music that Jim, Linda, and the rest of NIBGA have been espousing all these years.

When I look at the great lineup we have at the fall festival, I think about the depth of bluegrass music, spanning everything from the traditional grass of Sammy Adkins all the way out and around through the more modern sounds of groups like My Brother's Keeper. This music will continue to grow, and young folks like those at Hoot Camp will grow it. But the music is all still, and always will be, grounded in the same homegrown spirit.

I liken this to the effect of Artificial Intelligence (AI) on our world. When I look at graphics that AI generates, or read stories that AI crafts, I sometimes notice things that don't quite fit for those who are familiar and comfortable with the subject matter AI addresses. We might see instruments whose sizes are out of proportion or facts that don't quite fit with actual history. But, does AI capture the right spirit? Does it help evoke the feelings that we want? Maybe AI frees us from some of the chains that reality uses to hold us down.

Who would think of putting a cello on a bluegrass poster? Al might. Does a cello belong in bluegrass? The Debutants think so. And I agree – as the music grows, it becomes what we make of it. We could maybe argue whether at some point the music becomes "newgrass" or something else instead of bluegrass. But I don't want Continued next page

Debutants' Hoot Camp was a "Jammtastic" Success

The first inaugural Debutant's Hoot Camp was a wonderful week of musical workshops and guided jam sessions! 45 young musicians from Fort Wayne, Warsaw, Kendallville, and surrounding areas began the week as strangers and ended as friends and musical collaborators. Hosted by the Community Arts Academy at PFW and sponsored by the Northern Indiana Bluegrass Association under its 501 (c)(3) nonprofit umbrella, Hoot Camp included students ages 10-18 from absolute beginner to advanced skill levels. Each student began the day with their instrument specific teacher.

Walking around the music center it was easy to hear Sean Hoffman and Lauren Blair coaching their young fiddlers. With Jon Swain and Kenny Taylor leading the guitar players, Lynn Nicholson coaching the mandolins, Ellen Coplin teaching the cellos and Michael Earl Newsome guiding the banjo students, Bluegrass music was floating through the halls!

Students learned two traditional tunes, and three Debutants originals as well as taking classes in improvisation, how to join a jam session, songwriting, and harmony singing.

To conclude the week of camp students eagerly tuned up their instruments for a final concert side-by-side with Debutants on the Baker Street Centre stage. With a packed house of over 300 attendees the room was crackling with enthusiasm! The young musicians performed the traditional tune Old Joe Clark with solos. They then sang and played their own rendition of Little Liza Jane complete with their newly composed verses. Ending with three favorite Debutants songs they then turned the stage over to their camp teachers and sang and danced to an hour of music.
